4.3.1 Public resources (lifelong learning)	Give people who aren't enrolled in classes at the Integral University free access to educational resources like computers, the library, online courses, and lectures. In keeping with the vision and mission of the University, the library aims "to promote knowledge generation and application through its effective dissemination". The library, therefore, acts as the main learning resource centre of the university and provides services and facilities to meet the requirements of the university's teaching, training, research, and consultancy, through one Central Library and 14 departmental libraries. The library and information science professionals manage all the libraries. The total collection strength of the Integral University Library System (IULS) is more than 1.40 lakhs.

These programs can be customized lectures, demonstrations, or student-run voluntary programs that help underprivileged communities, local schools, and communities. In addition to raising awareness and advancing education, this kind of outreach enhances the educational experience for the participating pupils. Putting on specialised talks or demonstrations in neighbourhood schools or community centres is one of the most important outreach strategies. To ensure the content is interesting and accessible to a range of age groups and educational backgrounds, Integral University, for instance, organises workshops on science, technology, health education, environmental awareness, or life skills. These seminars give IU students the chance to apply what they have learnt in the classroom to real-world problems and can help raise educational standards in the surrounding areas by imparting useful, real-world knowledge. On the other hand, regular outreach projects, such tutoring sessions for a semester, educational camps, or continuing collaborations with nearby schools, might be organised and scheduled. Both kinds of projects have unique benefits; whereas planned activities guarantee continuity and long-term impact, ad hoc activities give flexibility and reactivity.

4.4.1 Indicator: Proportion of firstgeneration students

This percentage is calculated by dividing the total number of students beginning a first degree by the number of students who are designated as the first sibling in their family to attend college.

First-generation students make up about 20% of Integral University first-degree students.

This is a crucial metric for understanding how the university is working to improve the quality of education for families with less education by implementing a registration and admissions process for first-generation students.

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
